CURRENT INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS



Lake Dam Spillway Resurface

This is the final phase in a roughly \$3 million rehab project at the Lake Dam. This phase will include resurfacing/re-coating of the concrete spillway.





FY 22-23 Pavement Maintenance Project

\$2.8 million project. This project will improve several segments of streets citywide.

PROJECTS IN PROGRESS



LOWRY BRIDGE PROJECT

Will replace three deteriorated metal pipe culverts where Cat Creek crosses Lowry just east of the Industrial intersection. This crossing has historically flooded even during moderate rain events causing public safety concerns.

FREDERICK ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

Improving Frederick Road from where Highway 20 will intersect North Frederick to the east side of Lowe's.

Once the New Highway 20 project is opened, this street will see significant traffic increases.

SANITARY SEWER MASTER PLAN

A consultant is preparing a master plan for the Sanitary Sewer system in the city to address current and future needs. This planning document will be used for many years to come.

PROJECTS IN PROGRESS



OAKWOOD LIFT STATION UPGRADES

This \$250,000 project will upgrade a sanitary sewer lift station that serves the Oakwood addition. New fencing, electrical work, concrete work and addition of a standby power generator are included in the scope of work.

SEQUOYAH COMPLEX

Includes the Police Department Firing Range (\$5 million estimated cost). Fire Department Training Facility (\$3 million estimated cost) and the Solid Waste Transfer Station (\$2 million estimated) cost). This will be a phased project over the next 5-10 years.

ELECTRIC SUBSTATION UPGRADES

This 1.5 million project will rehab and update three of the city's substation transformers and will improve system reliability. This project will bid in May 2023. Work should begin in Fall of 2023 if weather permits.








How it Works


One penny in sales tax will be dedicated to funding public safety programs.


